God's Great and Precious Promises

2 Peter 1:1-7; Hebrews 4:13-25 (NLT)

Introduction

The circumstances of life or the promises of God—upon which are you standing?

In all likelihood, you're standing on one of those two...which one are you standing on? As we named last week, life in this broken world is hard. Circumstances like we encountered in the past few weeks, bring us crashing face to face with some of these harsh realities. It causes our world to shake!

What's shaking your world right now? When our world is reeling, when we feel vulnerable, where do we turn?

I would suggest that God has provided a refuge for us: God's great and precious promises.

God Our Promise Maker and Promise Keeper

By his divine power, **God has given us** everything we need for living a godly life. We have received all of this by coming to know him, the one who called us to himself by means of his **marvelous glory and excellence.**

Here we find one of the amazing promises in all Scripture. God has given us everything we need for living a godly life. By entering into a personal, day-to-day relationship with our Lord, we gain access to all the provisions we need to live faithfully and fruitfully as God designed us to do!

Listen to Eugene Peterson's translation of those verses in the Message:

"Everything that goes into a life of pleasing God has been miraculously given to us by getting to know, personally and intimately, the One who invited us to God. The best invitation we ever received! We were also given absolutely terrific promises to pass on to you—your tickets to participation in the life of God after you turned your back on a world corrupted by lust."

Folks, that's staggering in its scope. How many of you have spent hours even days planning for a vacation trip to make sure you have absolutely everything you might need on that excursion? Then, no matter how hard you try, there always seems to be something you forgot, something that you hadn't reckoned you'd need. Well, with God, that never happens. God in his goodness provide everything we need! What a relief!

God is the ultimate Promise Maker and Promise Keeper! It all comes from God's essential nature: **God's glory and excellence(goodness).**

- o "Glory" (Doxa) speaks of a manifestation of God's true nature, presence, or likeness. He is glorified when He is allowed to be seen as He really is.
- "Excellence" (Arete) came to mean quality of life which made someone stand out as excellent.
 Arete never meant cloistered virtue, or virtue of attitude, but virtue which is demonstrated in life, in action.

His promises are irrevocable because of who God is:

- God is unchanging. He sees the end from the beginning. He's never caught off guard by the unexpected. He makes no mid-course corrections. He is not victimized by moods or weather. "He never changes or casts a shifting shadow" (James 1:17 NLT).
- o **God is faithful.** "God can be trusted to keep his promise" (Heb. 10:23 NLT).
- God is strong. He does not overpromise and underdeliver. "God is able to do whatever he promises" (Rom. 4:21 NLT).
- o **God cannot lie.** "It is impossible for God to lie" (Heb. 6:18 NLT).

Great and Precious Promises

"And because of his glory and excellence, he has given us great and precious promises. These are the promises that enable you to share his divine nature and escape the world's corruption caused by human desires."

7,487. That's right. There are 7,487 promises in God's Word! Someone spent a year-and-a-half attempting to catalogue all the promises God made to humanity.

What are a few of these? Created and blessed...Forgiven...Adopted as sons and daughters...Given grace of all kinds...Gifted with the Holy Spirit...Comforted in the midst of suffering...Strengthened for the journey...Provided for along the way...Healing for our wounds...Bodily resurrection...Eternity in God's Presence...Reign with Christ forever

- Precious (timios) to value or honor...describes that which is valuable, highly prized, desirable, costly, as a precious stone, an apt adjective to modify the spiritual riches inherent in the promises of God.
- Magnificent (<u>megistos</u>) is the superlative of <u>megas</u>. A superlative is an adjective that denotes an extreme or unsurpassed level or extent. The idea of superlative is that it surpasses all others! Superlative speaks of the highest degree. Since <u>megas</u> means great (including great in power, authority, etc), you can picture the idea inherent in the superlative <u>megistos</u>, which means greatest, exceeding great or preeminent. It is surprising that this verse marks the only use

of **megistos** in the New Testament. Stop for a moment and meditate on what Peter is saying. He is speaking of the incomparable magnitude of God's promises.

Why does Peter call these promises "great" and "precious"? What makes God's promises so powerful in the life of believers?

- 1. God's promises **jumpstart** us when we are stalled by our circumstances; help us get unstuck
- 2. God's promises help us *reframe* our circumstances, see from God's kingdom perspective
- 3. God's promises *infuse* our faith with strength; quicken our faith with divine resources
- 4. God's promises *anchor* us when life is stormy
- 5. God's promises *open* shut doors and lead us to new pathways
- 6. God's promises awaken us to our hope in Christ

A nine-year-old by the name of Chris came down with mononucleosis as summer approached...The doctor ordered Chris to stay indoors for the entire summer. Chris was a rambunctious, athletic, outgoing kid. To be told to spend the summer indoors? No Little League baseball, fishing trips, no swimming at the pool, and bike rides? Might as well trap an eagle in a bird cage.

Chris's dad was a man of faith and encouraged Chris to latch onto one of God's promises to turn bad things into good (Genesis 50:20 for instance). His dad resolved to find something good in the quarantine. He sold guitars in his drugstore and wasn't a half-bad guitarist himself. So he gave Chris a guitar. Each morning he taught him a new chord or technique and told him to practice it all day. Chris did. Turns out, he had a knack for playing the guitar. By the end of the summer, Chris was playing Willie Nelson tunes and even beginning to write some songs of his own.

Within a few years Chris was leading worship in churches. And, fast-forward, within a few decades he was regarded as the most sung songwriter in the world. Perhaps you've heard some of his music? "How Great Is Our God" or "Holy Is the Lord" or "Jesus Messiah" or "Love Ran Red." My favorite CD I listen to in my car is one of his recordings, "Never Lose Sight." Chris Tomlin!

All because a father and son latched hold of God's promises!

Results of Living a Promise-Filled Life

- Partakers of the God's Divine Nature: We become more and more like Christ in both our inner beings and our outer actions.
- Escape of the World's Corruption: quite literally we put away the lust that causes corruption

Becoming People of the Promise

"In view of all this, **make every effort to respond to God's promises.** Supplement your faith with a generous provision of moral excellence, and moral excellence with knowledge, ⁶ and knowledge with self-control, and self-control with patient endurance, and patient endurance with godliness, ⁷ and godliness with brotherly affection, and brotherly affection with love for everyone."

Abraham is our travel guide into becoming people of the promise...Romans 4:13-25 (NLT)

"He plunged into the promise and came up strong, ready for God, sure that God would make good on what he had said."

Romans 4:20 (MSG)

Clearly, God's promise to give the whole earth to Abraham and his descendants was based not on his obedience to God's law, but on a right relationship with God that comes by faith. ¹⁴ If God's promise is only for those who obey the law, then faith is not necessary and the promise is pointless. ¹⁵ For the law always brings punishment on those who try to obey it. (The only way to avoid breaking the law is to have no law to break!)

- ¹⁶ So the promise is received by faith. It is given as a free gift. And we are all certain to receive it, whether or not we live according to the law of Moses, if we have faith like Abraham's. For Abraham is the father of all who believe. ¹⁷ That is what the Scriptures mean when God told him, "I have made you the father of many nations." **This happened because Abraham believed in the God who brings the dead back to life and who creates new things out of nothing.**
- ¹⁸ Even when there was no reason for hope, Abraham kept hoping—believing that he would become the father of many nations. For God had said to him, "That's how many descendants you will have!" ¹⁹ And Abraham's faith did not weaken, even though, at about 100 years of age, he figured his body was as good as dead—and so was Sarah's womb.
- ²⁰ Abraham never wavered in believing God's promise. In fact, his faith grew stronger, and in this he brought glory to God. ²¹ He was fully convinced that God is able to do whatever he promises. ²² And because of Abraham's faith, God counted him as righteous. ²³ And when God counted him as righteous, it wasn't just for Abraham's benefit. It was recorded ²⁴ for our benefit, too, assuring us that God will also count us as righteous if we believe in him, the one who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead. ²⁵ He was handed over to die because of our sins, and he was raised to life to make us right with God.

Conclusion ...

Russell Kelso Carter was a star athlete of a military academy and an excellent student academically, who went on to be a successful teacher and coach. He then spent several years as an ordained Methodist minister, after which he went to medical school. He spent the last of his professional years as a doctor of medicine. Carter was also a musician and songwriter. Although Carter was a professed Christian most of his life, it wasn't until a medical crisis of his own with his heart that he began to understand the reality and power of Bible promises. At age 30, he was declining in health and his heart was in critically weakened condition. Worse yet, the physicians said they could do no more for him.

Carter turned to God for help and healing. He knelt and made a promise that healing or no, his life was finally and forever, fully consecrated to the service of the Lord. It was from that moment that the written Word of God became alive to Carter. He began to rely upon the promises of healing, determining to believe no matter what his physical condition, no matter how he felt.

Over the course of the next several months his strength returned, and his heart was completely healed! Carter lived another healthy 49 years. Interestingly, his most noted song was written several years before his healing miracle. But those words became more than words and music to him.

"Standing on the Promises" became an integral part of his life.
